

Campus Climate Survey on Sexual Violence Spring 2019

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SURVEY ADMINISTRATION

The Social Science Research Lab (SSRL) was commissioned by SDSU's Title IX Coordinator Jessica Rentto and Dr. Emilio Ulloa to program and distribute the 2019 SDSU Campus Climate Survey on Sexual Violence to students enrolled at the SDSU main campus during the Spring 2019 semester. Similar surveys were conducted on campus in 2015 and 2017.

Survey Instrument

In the 2019 version of the survey, modules developed by the Administrator Researcher Campus Climate Collaborative (ARC3) were added and several modules used previously were updated. Changes to the survey are described in detail in Appendix A.

The survey was programmed for online administration using the Qualtrics Survey Software package. Programming included locations for responses, checks for acceptable responses, instructions to respondents, necessary skip patterns, and randomized routing assignment for specific sections of the survey. Programming and data conversion into SPSS were tested prior to survey implementation.

An introduction page was included in the survey, which informed all potential survey respondents about the purpose of the study. The introduction also included a brief description of the sensitive nature of the questions, and the associated risks and discomforts that might be caused by some questions. In addition, survey respondents were informed about the voluntary nature of survey participation, and given tips on how to protect their privacy if they chose to participate. Survey respondents were also informed that they could exit the survey at any time. At the end of the survey, a list of resources and contact information was provided.

Student email addresses used for survey dissemination were provided by Enrollment Services. On April 8, 2019, an email invitation to participate in the survey was sent to 31,823 students. Thirty-two email addresses bounced, thus making the sample size 31,791. Six separate reminder emails were sent to non-respondents (April 15, April 23, May 2, May 9, May 13, and May 15.) The survey link was deactivated on May 20, 2019.

All students were informed in the email invitation that if they participated and completed the survey, they would be offered a chance to enter a raffle to win several \$50 gift cards to the SDSU Bookstore. In addition, some instructors also offered course credit for completing the survey.

Publicizing the Survey

The survey was publicized by both the SDSU Sexual Violence Task Force staff and student groups including FratMANers/SISSTER. Publicity efforts included setting up tables during various events and pop-up tents. The Task Force staff also created marketing materials asking students "Have you taken the campus climate survey?" that were posted on digital displays on campus and on various social media platforms. These materials included information on how to find the survey invitation in their email inbox and information about incentives.

The Task Force staff collaborated with students by encouraging them to distribute flyers about the survey in their classroom, or to contact peers personally about the survey. An email was sent to members of the University Senate encouraging faculty and staff to support the Climate Survey by finding creative ways to encourage and incentivize student participation.

Response Rate

A total of 4,148 students completed the survey. This represents a response rate of 13%. This response rate is significantly lower than the 30% response rate achieved in the 2015 survey, but higher than the response rate from 2017, which was 11%. This response rate is consistent with the response rate typically achieved in surveys of SDSU students.

NON-RESPONSE BIAS

Low response rates concern survey researchers due to a potential for unit non-response bias. As response rates decrease, the probability that the attitudes, experiences, and beliefs of non-respondents diverge from those who responded also increases¹. The impact of nonresponse on an estimate depends on the relationship between the outcome of interest and decision to respond,² meaning that if survey participation is not heavily correlated with survey content, answers of responders and non-responders may not differ substantially. In a meta-analysis of 59 surveys³, a very weak relationship between nonresponse rate and non-response bias was found, concluding that non-response, by itself, is a poor predictor of absolute relative nonresponse bias. Researchers have increasingly examined impact of unit nonresponse on survey estimates and some have found no evidence of substantial nonresponse bias⁴. An examination⁵ of the relationship between low response rates and the reliability of five measures widely used in higher education assessment found that for surveys with large sampling frames, reliable estimates can be obtained with lower response rates.

Respondent Demographics

The demographics of the survey respondents varied slightly from those of the SDSU student population. There were far more female respondents than male, and seniors were less likely to respond to the survey than freshmen, sophomore, juniors, or graduate students. The ethnicities of survey respondents and the SDSU student population cannot be compared, because the survey allowed students to choose more than one ethnic category.

SURVEY RESULTS

Key survey questions were asked of all 4,148 respondents. However, in order to reduce the length of the survey for individual respondents, several sections of the survey were randomly assigned to approximately one-third of all respondents. In these instances, the actual number of respondents who received the question is indicated. Charted percentages are calculated based on the respondents who answered the question. In order to assess differences between gender groups, crosstabulations by gender were performed for most variables. Significant differences between gender groups are indicated by asterisks (*) on the charts. Additionally, for key questions in the "Survey Results: Experiences" section, crosstabulations were also run by sexual orientation (recoded as "Heterosexual" and "Not Heterosexual" and ethnicity (recoded as "White only" or "Not White only"). Only crosstabulations that indicated significant differences between groups are charted in this section.

Survey Results: Knowledge

CAMPUS POLICIES, PROCEDURES, AND RESOURCES

These questions assess student knowledge of SDSU policies and procedures regarding sexual violence, as well as their awareness of available campus resources. These questions were displayed to all respondents. Respondents were asked to indicate whether a statement regarding consent was correct or incorrect, by selecting "true," "false," or "I don't know." **Most respondents were aware of what constitutes consent and what constitutes rape.**

REPORTING SEXUAL ASSAULT

All respondents were asked, in an open-ended question, where a student could go to report a sexual assault, or where they would go to report a sexual assault. Respondents could indicate more than one response for each of these questions. For both questions, **the places most frequently identified by respondents were (1) 911, the** SDSU police, or the San Diego Police, and (2) the Student Health Center or Student Counseling and Psychological Services.

Survey Results: Attitudes

RAPE MYTHS ACCEPTANCE SCALE

The Illinois Rape Myth Acceptance Scale (IRMA) assesses the extent to which college students believe myths surrounding sexual violence. It specifically focuses on accountability for rape and victim blaming. This measure was randomly presented to roughly one-third of all survey respondents (n=1,277).

If a girl is raped while she is drunk, she is at least somewhat responsible for letting things get out of hand.* When girls go to parties wearing slutty clothes, they are asking for trouble.* If a girl goes to a room alone with a guy at a party, it is her own fault if she gets raped.* If a girl acts like a slut, eventually she is going to get into trouble.* When guys rape, it is usually because of their strong desire for sex.* Guys don't usually intend to force sex on a girl, but sometimes they get too sexually carried away.* Rape happens when a guy's sex drive goes out of control. * If a guy is drunk, he might rape someone unintentionally. It shouldn't be considered rape if a quy is drunk and didn't realize what he was doing.* If both people are drunk, it can't be rape.* If a girl doesn't physically resist sex - even if protesting verbally - it can't be considered rape.* If a girl doesn't physically fight back, you can't really say it was rape.* If the accused "rapist" doesn't have a weapon, you really can't call it rape.* If a girl doesn't say "no" she can't claim rape.* A lot of times, girls who say they were raped agreed to have sex then regretted it.* Rape accusations are often used as a way of getting back at guys.* A lot of times, girls who say they were raped often led the guy on and then had regrets.* A lot of times, girls who claim they were raped have emotional problems.* Girls who are caught cheating on their boyfriends sometimes claim it was rape.*

PEER SOCIAL SUPPORT

This measure is intended to assess respondents' perceptions of peer norms regarding sex, dating violence, and sexual violence. This measure was randomly presented to roughly one-third of all survey respondents (n=1,322).

In general, students were most likely to believe that their friends would disapprove of forcing someone to have sex or of using physical force to resolve conflicts with dates.

READINESS TO HELP

This is intended to understand the extent to which students feel they can help reduce the problem of sexual violence on campus as well as the extent to which they feel they have a responsibility to do so. This measure was randomly presented roughly one-third of all survey respondents (n=1,309).

In general, respondents feel strongly about the issue of sexual violence on campus and express a desire to learn more about the issue or to participate in efforts around the issue. However, fewer students indicated that they are currently participating in such efforts.

FEAR OF RAPE

This scale aims to assess how fearful survey participants are about being raped. The measure also aims to assess the survey participant's fear of being raped by a stranger, an acquaintance, or a group of two or more people on or around campus. The questions on this scale were randomly displayed to 1,039 survey participants.

The identity of the potential perpetrator (stranger versus non-stranger) was more likely to influence respondents' fear of rape than was geographic location (on-campus versus off-campus). Students are much more likely to fear being raped by a stranger, though evidence indicates acquaintance rape is far more likely.



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Survey Results: Experiences

BYSTANDER INTERVENTION

The Bystander Confidence measure used in the 2015 and 2017 surveys was replaced in 2019 by the Bystander Intervention scale, which is used to assess the frequency of student behaviors in a situation where a friend or stranger may have been at risk for experiencing sexual misconduct.

Respondents were more likely to have intervened when it did not involve a direct confrontation with a perpetrator.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT BY SDSU FACULTY MEMBER, INSTRUCTOR, OR STAFF MEMBER

All respondents were asked if they experienced any of the following forms of sexual harassment from a faculty member, instructor, or staff member. During data analysis, the original 5 response options (never, once or twice, sometimes, often, many times) were collapsed into two categories: "never" and "once or more".

Roughly, one fourth of respondents indicated that an SDSU faculty member, instructor, or staff member had made an offensive sexist remark or treated them differently because of their sex.

The 1,432 respondents who indicated they had experienced sexual harassment from a faculty or staff member were asked to think about the one situation that had the greatest effect on them, and were asked follow-up questions about that situation.

The majority of the respondents said that the situation that had the greatest effect on them involved sexist or sexually offensive language, gestures, or pictures, that the harasser was a male, and that the incident involved a faculty member. The majority of respondents said that they reacted to the situation by ignoring the person and doing nothing. Only 3% of the respondents said they reported the person

Differences between Demographic Groups

In order to determine whether sexual harassment by an SDSU faculty member, instructor or staff was significantly associated with specific student demographics, crosstabulations by gender, sexuality (recoded as a binary variable), and ethnicity (recoded as a binary variable) were run. For this purpose, any instance of sexual harassment in the previous question was combined into one binary variable: no harassment reported and any harassment reported.

Respondents who identified their gender as other or female were more likely than male respondents to indicate being sexually harrassed by an SDSU faculty member, instructor, or staff member.



Respondents who reported their sexuality as non-heterosexual were more likely than those who identified as gay, lesbian, bisexual or other to indicate being sexually harrassed an SDSU faculty member, instructor, or staff member.



Respondents who categorized their ethnicity as 'White only' were more likely than those who categorized their ethcnicity as "not White only' to be sexually harrassed by an SDSU faculty, instructor, or staff member.



SEXUAL HARASSMENT BY OTHER STUDENTS

All respondents were asked if they experienced any of the following forms of sexual harassment from another student. Response options displayed included never, once or twice, sometimes, often, and many times. During data analysis, the original five response options were collapsed into two categories: "never" and "once or more".

The 1,963 respondents who indicated they had experienced one or more incidents of sexual harassment by another student were asked to think about the situation that had the greatest effect on them, and answer several follow-up questions about that situation.

Over half of the respondents said that the situation that had the greatest effect on them involved sexist or sexually offensive language, gestures, or pictures, that the harasser was male, and an undergraduate student, and that the incident took place on campus. Only 5% of respondents indicated that the harasser was a graduate or professional student.



Differences between Demographic Groups

In order to determine whether sexual harassment by another student was significantly associated with specific student demographics, crosstabulations by gender, sexuality (recoded as a binary variable), and ethnicity (recoded as a binary variable) were run. For this purpose, any instance of sexual harassment in the previous question was combined into one binary variable: no harassment reported and any harassment reported.



Respondents who identified their gender as female or other were more likely to report being sexually harrassed by another student.

Respondents who identified their sexuality as not heterosexual were more likely to report being sexually harrassed by another student.



Respondents who identified their ethnicity as 'White only' only were more likely to report being sexual harrassed by another student.



SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVALENCE AT SDSU

For the purposes of this study, two measures of sexual assault prevalence were used.

Self-Defined Sexual Assault

The first measure of sexual assault is self-defined by an answer of "yes" to the question "Since becoming a student at SDSU, have you been a victim of any sexual assault?" Sixteen percent (n=493) respondents answered yes to this question.¹¹

Any (SES Scale-Defined) Sexual Assault

A second measure, called "Any Sexual Assault," is based on a respondent's answers to the questions asked in the Sexual Experience Scale (SES Revised scale). This scale is used to measure the extent of victimization and perpetration of unwanted sexual experiences, uses non-judgmental specific language, and avoids legal terms, in order to facilitate the respondent's ability to identify and recall incidents that constitute various forms of unwanted sexual experiences. The five scenarios included in the scale are described in the table below. Based on answers to the SES scale, 23% (n=952) of respondents reported having experienced at least one of the five sexual assault scenarios.

¹¹ A separate question asked respondents "Have you ever been raped?" and 13% of the respondents (N=407) said yes. This question is not included in any further analysis, since it does not ask if the rape occurred after the respondent became a student at SDSU.

Circumstances of Sexual Assault Incidents since Becoming a Student at SDSU

The 952 respondents who had experienced one or more of the scenarios listed in the SES section were asked to consider the incident that had the greatest effect on them and answer follow-up questions about that incident.

The majority of sexual assaults occurred either on campus or within one mile of campus.

The majority of the respondents said that alcohol was involved in the incident.



The majority of the respondents indicated that the experience occurred during their first year at SDSU.



About 4% of the respondents (n=39) said they moved or changed where they live due to the incident. Four percent (n=40) also said that they dropped a class or changed their class schedule due to the incident. **Twenty-six percent of the respondents (n=234) said the incident had other effects on their academics**.

Differences between Demographic Groups

In order to determine whether experiencing sexual assault was significantly associated with specific student demographics, crosstabulations by gender, sexuality (recoded as a binary variable), and ethnicity (recoded as a binary variable) were run. The following charts only depict the subgroup of students who indicated they had experienced sexual assault either by their responses to the SES scale questions or by their response to the question "Since becoming a student at SDSU, have you been a victim of any sexual assault?"

The information below does not apply to the entire student population at SDSU or all of the survey respondents.

Female respondents were most likely to indicate having experienced a sexual assault since becoming a student at SDSU, on both measures.



Respondents who did not identify their sexuality as heterosexual were slightly more likely to have experienced sexual assault, on both measures.



Respondents who identified their ethnicity as 'White only' were slightly more likely to have experienced sexual assault, on both measures.

STUDENT PERPETRATION OF SEXUAL ASSAULT

In the 2019 survey, respondents were asked a series of questions about **perpetration of sexual assault**. This set of questions uses non-judgmental specific language and avoids legal terms in order to facilitate the respondent's ability to identify and recall incidents that constitute various forms of unwanted sexual experiences. The five scenarios included in the scale are:

- I fondled, kissed, or rubbed up against the private areas of someone's body (lips, breast/chest, crotch, or butt) or removed some of their clothes without their consent (but did not attempt sexual penetration).
- I had oral sex with someone or had someone perform oral sex on me without their consent.
- I put my penis or I put my fingers or objects into someone's vagina without their consent.
- I put in my penis or I put my fingers or objects into someone's butt without their consent.
- Even though it didn't happen, I TRIED to have oral, anal, or vaginal sex with someone or make them have oral sex with me without their consent.

Based on this scale, 2% (n=67) of respondents reported having perpetrated at least one of the five sexual assault scenarios.

Circumstances of Student Perpetrated Sexual Assault Incidents

The victim was frequently a romantic partner, former romantic partner, or a friend.

STUDENT EXPERIENCE WITH REPORTING SEXUAL ASSAULT

Sixteen percent (n=493) respondents answered "yes" to the question "Since becoming a student at SDSU, have you been a victim of any sexual assault?" Of these, 71% (n=350) said they told someone about the assault, and of those, 9% (n=44) reported the incident to an SDSU representative.

RELATIONSHIP VIOLENCE

The 2019 survey included three scales measuring relationship violence. One scale addressed dating violence, one specifically addressed physical violence, and one addressed injury associated with relationship violence.

Dating Violence Victimization Prevalence

The questions about dating violence victimization items were randomly asked of roughly one-third of the survey participants (n=1,034). Respondents were not screened based on relationship or dating experiences. Of these, 13% (n=135) said that they had been the victim of dating violence since they enrolled at SDSU. Respondents who said they had experienced at least one of the situations one or more times were asked to consider the situation that had the greatest effect on them and answer follow-up questions about that situation.



In most instances, the perpetrator of

dating violence was male.

Dating Violence Perpetration Prevalence

Questions about dating violence perpetration were randomly presented to roughly one-third of all respondents (n=1,032). Only 55 students (5%) indicated that they had perpetrated dating violence as described in the statements since enrolling at SDSU, and most of the respondents who answered these questions were female.

Physical Violence Victimization

Questions about physical violence in relationships were presented to all students who indicated that they have had a partner since they began attending SDSU (n=3,082). Of those students, 19% (n=578) said they were the victim of some form of physical violence in a relationship in the past year.

Questions about physical violence perpetration were presented to all students who indicated that they have had a partner since they began attending SDSU (n=3,082). Of these students, 17% (n=534) said they had perpetrated some form of physical violence in a relationship in the past year.


Victim of Injury in a Relationship

Questions about injury in a relationship were presented to all students who indicated that they have had a partner since they began attending SDSU (n=3,082). Of these students, 5% (n=140) indicated that were injured by a partner in the past year.

Perpetrator of Injury in a Relationship

Questions about causing injury in a relationship were presented to all students who indicated that they have had a partner since they began attending SDSU (n=3,082). Of these students, 2% (n=66) said they caused physical injury to their partners in the past year.

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STALKING AND UNWANTED PURSUIT

Respondents were asked if during their time as a student at SDSU, they had ever experienced being persistently followed, harassed, and/or pursued in an unwanted way on or near SDSU campus. If a student indicated yes, follow-up questions asked for further information about the perpetrator and the severity of the stalking that occurred. This set of questions was randomly assigned to approximately one-third of survey participants.

Among the 1,038 respondents who were asked these questions, **17%** (**n=176**) **indicated that they had experienced being persistently followed and/or harassed and/or pursued by someone in an unwanted way on or around campus**. These 176 students were asked follow-up questions about their experience. Of these, only 31% considered the harassment as form of "stalking."



In the majority of instances of stalking or unwanted pursuit, the perpetrator was male.



Respondents who identified their gender as female or other were more likely to indicate having been stalked.



RECOMMENDATIONS

Programming

RAPE MYTHS ACCEPTANCE

• The Task Force might focus on rape myths that have higher "agree" percentages and use targeted messaging to address gaps in knowledge.

READINESS TO HELP

Based on the 2019 data, students seem to feel that sexual violence is an important issue in which they are interested. However, they are less likely to report that they are taking efforts to increase their awareness of the issue or to take action. It might be helpful to assess why this gap between contemplation and action exists.

- Are students sufficiently aware of opportunities where they can be informed about or involved with efforts to end sexual violence on campus?
- What current opportunities for this exist, and how are they currently being promoted to students?

FEAR OF RAPE

• Respondents do not seem to be aware that acquaintance rape is more common than rape by a stranger. Educational efforts can address this.

Survey Instrument

POLICIES

- P1 P6: Once the respondent answers these questions, the survey could provide the correct answer, in order to help students become more familiar with SDSU policies, specifically the question about "informal resolution." Additionally, remove the phrase 'At SDSU' from these questions. This phrasing could mislead students into believing that these statements are only true or false at SDSU (and not off campus).
- P7/P8: Instead of open-ended questions asking about where a student or the respondent could report sexual assault, provide choices, and a link to website e.g. Counselling & Psychological Services (<u>https://go.sdsu.edu/student_affairs/cps/Default.aspx</u>) or Title IX Office (<u>https://titleix.sdsu.edu/)</u>. This would give students information about the options available (many students say they are unaware of where they can report or where they could go).
- P1_2 and P4_1: Eliminate duplicated questions. P1_2 "Sexual acts are considered non-consensual if a
 person is under the age of 18" and P4_1 "A person can give consent when they are under the age of 18"
 are nearly identical.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

• SHS1_1 to SHS1_30: Collapse option categories to "Never" and "One or more times."

BYSTANDER INTERVENTION

- **BYI_1 to BYI_7:** The current response categories are subjective. It might be more efficient and more informative to change the response options to "Never" and "One or more times."
- BYI_1 to BYI_7: "Not applicable" should be changed to "I have never been in this situation."

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

- SHF_1 to SHF_18 and SHS_1 to SHS_30: Collapse response options to "Never" and "One or more times."
- SHS_29: Add "social media" to question text.
- SHS_3 and SHS_4: Combine two questions: "Was the other person: (1) undergraduate student (2) graduate student, (3) I don't know."

RELATIONSHIP VIOLENCE

- DVV_1_1 to DVV_1_8: Collapse response options into "Never" and "One or more times."
- **DVV_3:** Since this section specifically asks about "any hook-up, boyfriend, girlfriend, husband, wife, or any exes," the question DVV_3 does not make sense and may be obscuring data and should be removed or should only include the same relationship categories included in the initial scale.

DEMOGRAPHIC QUESTIONS

- Remove questions about student major (D4) and GPA (D5). Data is not used for any analysis.
- D10 (Ethnicity): Use the same format that is used by Enrollment Services.
- D11 (Gender): Remove "please specify" open end.
- D12 (Sexuality): Remove "please specify" open end.

Data Analysis

 Due to the small sample size of students who identify their gender as "Other," many, if not all, of the crosstabulations using this variable contain cells with counts of less than five. In future years, if statistical significance is the primary focus of this analysis, "other" could be defined as a missing value prior to running crosstabulations.

APPENDIX A. DESCRIPTION OF SURVEY INSTRUMENT MEASURES

In 2019 several new measures and questions were added to the survey instrument. As in 2017, in an effort to reduce the survey length for individual respondents, respondents were randomly assigned to one of three measures at two different points in the survey. In the first randomized section, respondents were shown one the following: Illinois Rape Myth Scale, Peer Social Support Measures, or Readiness to Help. In the second randomized section, respondents were shown one of the following: Short Form Stalking Measure, Dating Violence Prevalence measures, or Fear of Rape scale. Each of these measures was displayed to roughly one-third of the respondents.

DESCRIPTIONS OF SCALES

Bystander Intervention [NEW]

Bystander Intervention is measured using a modified version of the Bystander Attitudes Scale. The scale was shortened to include seven items to assess frequency of specific behaviors students had exercised in a situation where a friend or stranger may have been at risk for experiencing sexual misconduct.

Illinois Rape Myth Acceptance Scale

This scale is included to assess the extent to which college students believe myths surrounding sexual violence. This scale is consistently updated to reflect language nuances, and to capture the subtle and covert ways in which rape myths evolve amongst college populations. The scale specifically focuses on accountability for rape and victim blaming, which is related to the covert, subtle rape myths that blame the victim for the assault or excuse the perpetrator.

Peer Social Support [NEW]

Peer social support items assess participants' perceptions of peer norms regarding sex, dating violence, and sexual violence.

Readiness to Help

This measure aims to gauge the extent to which students on campus feel that they can help reduce the problem of sexual violence at SDSU. The scale also measures the extent to which students believe they have a responsibility to help reduce the problem. The framework for the scale is grounded in research about the causes of sexual assault on campuses as well as factors identified by health behavior theories for changing attitudes and behavior.

Dating Violence Section [NEW]

The Dating Violence Victimization module is derived from the Partner Victimization Scale and the Women's Experience with Battering Scale to assess both physical and psychological dating violence experienced by participants. Items on the partner victimization scale were developed from items on the Juvenile Victimization Questionnaire. The JVQ underwent a careful development process and has extensive reliability and validity data. In this module, items such as "Not including horseplay or joking around, the person pushed, grabbed, or shook me" assess the type and frequency of physical dating violence a participant has experienced; items such as "Not including horseplay or joking around, the person can scare me without laying a hand on me" assesses psychological dating violence. Both physical and psychological dating violence are assessed in this module to cover a range of experience with dating violence, rather than to form separate subscales.

Questions that asked about experiences that occurred "since I started at SDSU" were removed, and only questions that asked about experiences that occurred "in the past year." The JVQ questions were added in 2019.

Sexual Harassment Victimization – Faculty/Staff [NEW]

The Sexual Harassment by Faculty/Staff module utilizes the Department of Defense Sexual Experiences Questionnaire (SEQ-DoD), originally modified from the Sexual Experiences Questionnaire, to measure the type and frequency of sexual harassment by members of staff.

Sexual Harassment Victimization – Student [NEW]

Items 1-9 of Sexual Harassment by Students module were modified for the purposes of this survey from the Sexual Experiences Questionnaire, to measure the type and frequency of sexual harassment by students. These items have very high internal consistency as part of the ARC3 Campus Climate Survey (α=.93). Items 9-12 assess virtual sexual harassment using items from the AAUW Knowledge Networks Survey, and have strong internal consistency (α=.83).

SES Revised - Short Form Victimization

The SES Revised scale is used to measure the extent of victimization and perpetration of unwanted sexual experiences. This scale uses non-judgmental specific language and avoids legal terms in order to facilitate the respondent's ability to identify and recall incidents that constitute various forms of unwanted sexual experiences. For example, the scale avoids the word "rape" because the term is understood and defined differently by different respondents. Instead, the scale relies on behaviorally specific descriptions of acts (unwanted sexual experiences) and tactics (behaviors used by perpetrators to compel sex acts against consent) to solicit responses. These innovative features are now considered the standard in measuring perpetration and victimization.

SDSU administrators added several follow-up questions to this section of the survey, some of which were only displayed to respondents if they indicated that they had experienced any form of unwanted sexual experiences. In the 2019 survey, the questions about perpetration of unwanted sexual experiences were included, in the same format as the ARC3 question bank.

Policy/Resource Questions

This measure was created by SDSU to gauge students' understanding of campus policies regarding sexual assault and violence. The purpose of the measure is to assess students' knowledge and familiarity with available resources.

Short Form Stalking Measure

This measure aims to assess incidents of stalking and unwanted pursuit. Respondents were asked if during their time as a student at SDSU, they had ever experienced being persistently followed, harassed, and/or pursued in an unwanted way on or near SDSU campus. If a student indicated yes, follow-up questions were displayed in order to assess demographic information of the perpetrator and the severity of the stalking that occurred.
